George Jackman's Delightful Summer Excursions



This photograph shows the top of Pier Street in about 1900. On the right of the picture, under the clock, is Mrs Nicholls' Drapers shop, while on the left is Jackman's Royal Undercliff Posting Establishment, with a horse drawn carriage standing outside advertising Jackman's Excursions.

George Jackman had originally established himself as a 'Riding Master' in the 1870s at No 6 on the other side of the road, which was then still called Mill Street. He provided horses for hire by the day, hour, mile or job as well as carriages of every description. But to most visitors he was best known for his delightful Summer Excursions. As well as the Carisbrooke route advertised here, there was the even more popular Ventnor to Freshwater route, which in the summer ran every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and back again at the end of the day, in wind or rain, cloud or sunshine, a return journey of around fifty miles, three hours each way, with four fresh horses kept at Brighstone to take over, half way through the journey.

During the winter, when travelling in open carriages was not so tempting, most of the horses were out to grass, but by Easter they were brought in to the stables to be made fit for the coach services, many somewhat wild looking after their winter freedom in the meadows around Ventnor, and the young colts needing to be broken in for carriage service.

The excursions must have been very profitable, for in 1878 Jackman paid £3500 for Montpellier House which stood in its own grounds at the junction with the High Street, and moved his business there. The move coincided with the renaming of Mill Street as Pier Street, and Jackman's Royal Undercliff Posting Establishment at 1-3 Pier Street became one of the largest on the island. The entry gate led through the coach house, filled with carriages of all sorts and sizes, and then via a covered corridor into

the stable-yard. In the centre of the yard was a roofed area where coaches could stand in all weathers to be cleaned, using water from the old mill stream which ran under the property. Around this, on all sides, was stabling for 54 horses, with an exit into Pound Lane. All this in the area now covered by the Co-op car park.
